#### FROM THE PRINCIPAL

To end Week 4, we had the pleasure of presenting our 2024 student leadership groups. Including House Captains, SRC and Prefects, our school has not only a number of important forums for student voice but opportunities for further development of their leadership skills. For those who were unable to attend the Leadership Assembly, in my speech I referred to leadership not as being about a title and indeed nothing to do with the badge that is worn, but about the student themselves and the qualities they display through authentic action. After all, actions speak louder than words!

Then, last week, I was able to meet with the Primary Prefects and discuss the year ahead. Initially, they were most excited about what they got to do as a leader; the 'privileges' they felt came with the role. But, as we unpacked their responsibilities a little more, they started to orientate their thinking more strongly to viewing themselves as role models, and therefore seeing opportunities to positively influence and lead others, and make change. Impressively, they were then also brave enough to be open and honest about some of the personal challenges they might face in upholding their role with the respect, responsibility and honesty our school values require of them. But this courage to be vulnerable and become aware of areas of growth is what will ultimately make these students wonderful leaders! And I'm excited about how our student leaders, by showing this vulnerability, can encourage others to do the same; to reflect on their actions, their interactions with others and how they go about school life in ways they can be truly proud of. We can all talk the talk, but walking the walk often takes courage.

Which got me thinking about the power of home, school and the home-school partnership in supporting our students to <u>hold true to talking the talk and actually walk</u> the walk!

All students are capable leaders. And whether at school, at home or in the community, children use our behaviour as templates for how they should act. In our daily lives, simple acts of kindness, responsibility, and respect set a powerful example for our children to follow. Whether it's showing empathy towards others, practicing patience, or making environmentally conscious choices, we powerfully model responsible behaviour and what it means to do as we say. Supporting our children in this way enables them to walk the walk and truly realise the leader they can be.

How do you support your child/ren at home to walk the walk?

At the end of this newsletter, I have included an article from Michael Grose, an Australian parent educator, entitled, "Developing leadership skills in your child." The home is the most powerful place to support your child to develop these skills which we can then build on at school. I hope you find it a helpful read.


Our students should be very proud of their efforts on the day!


- Provides an environment for social interaction.





# Developing leadership skills in your child

Your child has the potential to be a leader given the right circumstances and environment. The following five leadership skills have been observed in student leaders in Australian primary schools and can be promoted by parents at home.

## Responsibility

Being a leader means that your child is willing to take responsibility and be accountable for their actions. Personal responsibility is shown when your child is accountable for their behaviour, for their belongings and for others. Practical ways to develop responsibility include:

- Giving them responsibility for part of their day
- . Encouraging them to restore relationships with others when they mess up
- Taking responsibility for household chores

#### Communication

While most leadership positions require your child to speak publicly their communication skills can be developed through regular one-on-one or small group experiences at home and at school. Practical ways to develop your child's communication skills include:

- · One-on-one conversations with adults
- Regular discussions at the meal table
- Encourage your child to participate fully in speaking activities at school

#### Organisation

Personal organisational skills and the ability to organise others are important for effective leadership. Practical ways to develop organisational skills include encouraging your child to:

- Keep their personal space tidy and organised
- Use a diary to help manage their time
- · Organise a weekly chores roster including all members of the family

#### Teamwork

Cooperating, encouraging and accepting others are essential qualities of an effective leader. Practical ways to develop a sense of teamwork include:

- · Play team games where children work together
- · Encourage siblings to cook and do other chores together
- . Focusing on your child's contribution to a team or group rather than individual achievement

## Emotional intelligence

An underestimated quality shared by most admired leaders is their ability to remain calm when things don't go well. This emotional intelligence skill requires self-awareness, an ability to recognise their emotions and respond appropriately to the emotions of others. You can nurture these skills in the following way:

- · Help your child recognise their emotions
- · Help your child recognise emotions in others
- . Teach your child to shift their mood

Leaders are needed in all walks of life – at work, in school, in families, in sport and in the wider community. The skills of leadership are sewn in the first group that they belong to – their family. By encouraging your child to be a contributing member of their family you are also helping to develop leaderships skills they can practise outside their family.
